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THE COLUMBIA CITY POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES THE RECOVERY OF THE PRESUMED BODY OF ELDERLY MISSING RESIDENT

Working in conjunction with the Oregon State Police and the Oregon State Crime Lab, the Columbia City Police Department announces the recovery of the presumed body of Frieda Mae Bahl. Mrs. Bahl was originally reported missing to the Columbia City Police Department in May of 2012.

Subsequent investigation into the matter, along with information provided by Stephen Bahl, who was recently arrested after grand jury indictment on charges stemming from this case, disclosed that Frieda Mae Bahl's remains had been buried in a wooded area off of Smith Road near Columbia City. These unidentified remains have been recovered and transported to the Medical Examiner's Office.

At this time both the cause and manner of death remain unknown. The body will undergo forensic examination and the investigation remains ongoing at this time.

The Columbia City Police Department would like to thank our citizens, law enforcement, and community partners who have been of great assistance in this investigation. Their tireless efforts and many hours of dedicated service have assisted us in bringing this case close to closure. The agencies involved in this case have included The Major Crimes Team, made up of representatives from the Oregon State Police, The Scappoose Police Department, The St. Helens Police Department, The Vernonia Police Department, The Columbia City Police Department, The Rainier Police Department, the Clatskanie Police Department, and the Columbia County Sheriff's Office. As well, the Department of Human Services - Adult Protective Services and Fraud Investigative Unit personnel were instrumental in the investigation of this case.

EXTRA CURBSIDE YARD DEBRIS COLLECTIONS DURING NOVEMBER

We are pleased to announce that Hudson Garbage Service will now provide weekly curbside yard debris collections for subscribed Columbia City customers during the month of November. Yard debris service will remain on an every-other-week basis for the remaining 11 months of the year. Yard debris collection service is provided on the same weekday as the customer's regular garbage collection service. CITY RECEIVES GRANT AWARD FOR SOURCE WATER PROTECTION

Columbia City has received a grant award from the Oregon Infrastructure Finance Authority in the amount of \$28,655 to complete a Source Water Assessment Update and develop a Source Water Protection Plan. A source water assessment identifies the potential risks to water quality and the susceptibility of the water supply to those risks. The purpose of the assessment is to provide the information the City needs in order to develop drinking water protection strategies, which will be used in the development of a Source Water Protection Plan.

PUBLIC HEARINGS SET FOR REVISIONS TO SIGN REGULATIONS

The Columbia City Planning Commission will hold a public hearing regarding proposed amendments to the sign regulations contained in the Columbia City Development Code. The meeting will be held on Tuesday, October 9, 2012, at 7 PM in the Council Chambers at City Hall, 1840 Second Street, Columbia City. Following the hearing, the Planning Commission may make a recommendation to the City Council. If the Planning Commission makes a recommendation following the October 9, 2012, hearing, the City Council will hold a public hearing regarding the proposed amendments on Thursday, October 18, 2012, at 6 PM in the Council Chambers at City Hall.

HOW TO SHELTER IN PLACE DURING A CHEMICAL OR RADIATION EMERGENCY

What Shelter-in-Place Means: One of the instructions you may be given in an emergency where hazardous materials may have been released into the atmosphere is to shelter-in-place. This is a precaution aimed to keep you safe and at times when an evacuation would be more risky. (This is not the same thing as going to a shelter in case of a storm.) Shelter-in-place means selecting a small, interior room, with no or few windows, and taking refuge there. It does not mean sealing off your entire home or office building.

Why You Might Need to Shelter-in-Place: Chemical, biological or radiological contaminants may be released accidentally, by a truck or facility, or intentionally by a terrorist. Should this occur, information will be provided by local authorities by television and radio stations or by telephone call through the Columbia Alert Network (CAN) on how to protect you and your family. The important thing is for you to follow the instructions of local authorities and know what to do if they advise you to shelter-in-place and keep a television and radio on to receive further information and instructions.

How to Shelter-in-Place

At Home:

- Close and lock all windows and exterior doors.
- If you are told there is danger of explosion, close the window shades, blinds or curtains.
- Turn off all fans, heating and air conditioning systems.
- Close the fireplace damper.
- Get your family disaster supplies kit and make sure the radio is working.
- Go to an interior room without windows that's above ground level. In the case of a chemical threat, an above-ground location is preferable because some chemicals are heavier than air, and may seep into basements even if the windows are closed.
- Bring your pets with you, and be sure to bring additional food and water supplies for them.
- It is ideal to have a hard-wired telephone in the room you select. Call your emergency contact and have the phone available if you need to report a life-threatening condition.



- If possible, you may want to use duct tape and plastic sheeting (heavier than food wrap) to seal any large cracks around the door and any vents into the room. This is only an extra precaution.
- Keep listening to your radio or television until you are told all is safe or you are told to evacuate. Local officials may call for evacuation in specific areas at greatest risk in your community.

In Your Vehicle:

If you are driving a vehicle and hear advice to “shelter-in-place” on the radio, take these steps:



- If you are very close to home, your office or a public building, go there immediately and go inside. Follow the shelter-in-place recommendations for the place you pick described above.
- If you are unable to get to a home or building quickly and safely, then pull over to the side of the road. Stop your vehicle in the safest place possible. If it is sunny outside, it is preferable to stop under a bridge or in a shady spot, to avoid being overheated.
- Turn off the engine.
- Close windows and vents.
- Listen to the radio regularly for updated advice and instructions.
- Stay where you are until you are told it is safe to get back on the road. Be aware that some roads may be closed or traffic detoured. Follow the directions of law enforcement officials.

Local officials on the scene are the best source of information for your particular situation. Following their instructions during and after emergencies regarding sheltering, food, water and clean up methods is your safest choice.

CHIEF'S CORNER

ANOTHER WORD OF THANKS: We would like to thank our citizens, community partners, and fellow law enforcement agencies who have assisted us in the Frieda Bahl Missing Person investigation. Many hours of hard work have gone into the investigation of this case, with many more to come. The DHS – Adult Protective Services and Fraud Investigative Unit have been a huge asset in this case. As well, the contributions of our law enforcement partners have been invaluable. These partners have been from the Major Crimes Team which is staffed by officers from agencies in our county. Specific contributing agencies include the Oregon State Police, the Columbia County Sheriff's Office, the Scappoose Police Department, and the St. Helens Police Department. Combined with these agencies your police officers have performed an exemplary job; specifically the investigative work of CCPD Sergeant Josh Harper and Officer Rob Greisen. We expect to file additional charges in this case and will provide further updates as soon as they are available. CODE ENFORCEMENT REMINDERS

- Ground excavation activities on steeply sloped properties may require geotechnical work, and they are prohibited between October 1 and April 15 of each year. Contact City Hall for more details prior to beginning excavation work.
- Burning household garbage or trash is prohibited. Garbage or trash includes food packaging, cardboard, plastic food containers, food products, etc.
- Sewer systems are designed to handle used water, human body waste, and toilet paper. Disposing of diapers, shop rags, grease, feminine products, plastic gloves, and other items into the sewer system is strictly prohibited.

Beginning **Saturday, November 3, through Sunday,**

November 18, yard debris may be burned outdoors within Columbia City. However, **burn permits are required prior to burning!** Permits may be obtained at City Hall or at any Fire Station within the Columbia River Fire & Rescue District. Please remember you will also need to call the "Burn Line" at (503) 397-4800 each day to see if it is a burn day.

HIGHWAY 30 SAFETY AWARENESS

The theme "Traffic Safety Begins With Me" is a great reminder for us all to be alert and to be prepared to follow the rules of the road when we get behind the wheel.

The leading cause of accidents on Highway 30 is turning issues, which account for 32% of all accidents. Rear ending crashes are the second leading cause of accidents and account for 23% of all crashes and many of these take place at stop lights and stop signs. And the third leading cause of accidents on Highway 30 is striking fixed objects, which account for 15% of all crashes.

Here are some general driver safety reminders to share with family, friends, employees and neighbors:

Traffic Safety Begins with Me!

- Give yourself at least a 3-second count when following cars.
- Be rested before driving so you are alert behind the wheel. And remember, if you are tired and can't remember the last few miles driven – you are in danger of falling asleep at the wheel. It's time to find a safe place to pull over and get some rest.
- Don't text and drive. Texting takes your eyes off the road for an average of 5 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of a football field completely blind*. (*Virginia Tech Transportation Institute Research)
- Remember that excessive speeding hurts everyone. Please follow posted speed limits.

- ✓ Household cleaners and disinfectants




