CITY RECEIVES DRINKING WATER SOURCE PROTECTION GRANT

The City has received a \$30,000 grant award from the State of Oregon Drinking Water Source Protection Fund. The funds will be used to decommission two dry wells that are located within the City well system's one-year time of travel protection zone. The project includes the construction of 900 linear feet of storm system, which will redirect the storm water into existing drainage swales. The project will reduce the risk of contamination to the City's water system.

CITY RECEIVES 100% FORGIVABLE SAFE DRINKING WATER LOAN

The City will receive a \$20,000 loan from the Safe Drinking Water Revolving Loan Fund to complete a project involving detailed water system mapping and the development of a GIS database of the existing water system assets. The loan is 100% forgivable, or similar to a grant.

CURBSIDE YARD DEBRIS EXTRA NOVEMBER COLLECTIONS

Don't forget!! Hudson Garbage Service will provide weekly curbside yard debris collections for subscribed Columbia City customers during the month of November. Yard debris service is provided on an every-other-week basis during the remaining 11 months of the year. Yard debris collection service is provided on the same weekday as the customer's regular garbage collection service. Interested citizens may subscribe for the yard debris service for a minimum period of one year by contacting Hudson Garbage Service at (503) 397-7153.

HOUSING REHABILITATION FUNDS ARE NOW AVAILABLE!

Is your house in need of repairs? Low-income homeowners may now be eligible for **no-interest, deferred payment loans!** The funds may be used to complete the following housing rehabilitation projects:

- Update electrical, plumbing or sewer
- Replace or update heat source
- Replace roof, doors, windows
- Structural repairs
- Foundation repairs
- Energy saving measures

BURN PERMITS ARE REQUIRED FOR OPEN BURNING PERIOD FOR YARD DEBRIS



Beginning **Saturday, November 5, through Sunday, November 20**, yard debris may be burned outdoors within Columbia City. However, **burn permits are required prior to burning!** Permits may be obtained at City Hall or at any Fire Station within the Columbia River Fire & Rescue District. **MEASURE 5-256
RENEWAL OF 5-YEAR LOCAL OPTION LEVY
FOR POLICE PROTECTION SERVICES**

What is Measure 5-256? Measure 5-256 submits to the voters the question of renewing a five-year local option levy to sustain current police protection services.

Why is the local option levy needed? The local option levy is needed to bridge the funding gap between the tax revenues collected under the City's permanent tax rate and the total cost of providing basic police protection services.

Since July 2004, the annual amount of total tax revenue generated by the City's permanent tax rate has consistently fallen short of funding a Police Department staffed by 2.5 paid full-time equivalents (FTEs) and volunteer police reserves.

Why is there a funding gap? Columbia City has one of the lowest permanent City property tax rates within the State of Oregon - just \$1.1346 per thousand. In comparison, some other cities in Columbia County levy the following permanent tax rates:

- City of Clatskanie \$6.2088
- City of Rainier \$4.8327
- City of Scappoose \$3.2268
- City of St. Helens \$1.9078
- City of Vernonia \$5.8163

In addition, Columbia City is primarily a bedroom community - there are few taxable commercial and industrial developments within the City. As a result, Columbia City collects just \$160.26 per capita from the permanent tax levy. In comparison, some other cities in Columbia County collect the following amounts per capita from their permanent tax rates:

- City of Clatskanie \$347.53
- City of Rainier \$774.75
- City of Scappoose \$271.01
- City of St. Helens \$126.86
- City of Vernonia \$328.71

What will the local option levy cost? \$0.67 per \$1,000 assessed value. A home with an assessed value of \$240,000 would pay \$160.80 per year.


How long will the local option levy last? Five years. At the end of five years, the levy will expire.

When will I vote on Measure 5-256? During the November 8, 2016 General Election.

When would I start to pay? November 2017.


How much do I pay now? The City levies a permanent tax rate of \$1.1346 per \$1,000 of assessed value, plus the current local option levy of \$0.67 per thousand, for a total tax rate of \$1.8046. Even the combined rate of \$1.8046 is among the lowest in the State of Oregon. The local option levy will expire after the current tax year unless it is renewed by voters. *(Continued on page 3)*

Comparison of Permanent Tax Rates




All Oregon cities with populations ranging from 1,500 to 2,500

Columbia City's Share of 2015-16 Property Tax






Does Columbia City spend more on police services than other cities? Columbia City Police Department's budgeted operating costs are actually low compared to other cities. In addition, the per capita operating costs of Columbia City's Police Department are noticeably lower than most small cities. Columbia City's Police Department maintains a high quality level of service with a paid staff of less than 2.5 full-time equivalents (FTEs) per 1,000 citizens - a ratio that is considerably lower than many small cities. Volunteer reserve officers assist the

department, and an on-call protocol applies if no one is on duty.


When I pay property taxes, where does all of the money go? Most of the property tax that you pay goes to other agencies. Columbia City receives just a small piece of the pie. The City's permanent rate, combined with the local option levy, is equal to just 12 percent of the total property tax bill, as shown in the graph above.

What will happen if the local option levy is not renewed? Without the levy, there is a significant funding gap as demonstrated by the graph above. The funding gap will create an unsustainable situation, forcing the City to consider other options, such as reducing service levels.

TELEPHONIC FRAUD ALERT! The past several weeks have seen a significant increase in attempted telephonic frauds within our (Continued on page 5)

community. The calls have originated from the "320" area code and have been conducted by an unknown male caller who speaks with a noticeably foreign accent. The male caller has claimed to be from the federal government, the IRS, as well as with attempting service in a federal court matter.

None of these calls have been legitimate and we want to warn our citizens to not become a victim of these attempted financial scams. Any correspondence with a legitimate organization will begin with written documents. In the event that future calls are received, please notify the police department. As well, the "Do Not Call Registry" can be utilized in order to protect your interests.

STAY CONNECTED IN EMERGENCIES! We would like to encourage our citizens to connect with us in order to receive emergency information and notifications. In order to achieve this goal several communication forums are used. In addition to the educational efforts of the City Newsletter we also incorporate participation in the Columbia Alert Network (CAN) system, as well as continued involvement with Facebook and Twitter accounts. RED CROSS HOLDS FREE EARTHQUAKE PREPAREDNESS PRESENTATIONS ACROSS OREGON

The American Red Cross is promoting community preparedness by kicking off a series of Prepare Out Loud presentations to help our region be prepared for disasters like a 9.0 Cascadia earthquake.

The Red Cross Prepare Out Loud presentation directly addresses the seismic significance of the Cascadia Subduction Zone and what to expect following an earthquake of this magnitude. Prepare Out Loud presenter, Steve Eberlein, was witness to the destruction of the 2004 Boxing Day Tsunami in Sri Lanka. The tsunami was caused by an underwater subduction zone earthquake and resulted in the deaths of nearly 300,000 people in 14 countries. His first-hand account of the incident lends perspective to the importance of preparedness. Following the Prepare Out Loud presentation, attendees will understand the steps they can take now to prepare for an earthquake and the central role their actions and voices play in building our community's resilience.

"Oregonians can be ready for disasters by taking simple steps to prepare now and sharing their preparedness actions," said Steve Eberlein, preparedness presenter with the Red Cross Cascades Region. "It's time for us to unlock the power of peer influence and bring sustainable cultural change to Oregon."


