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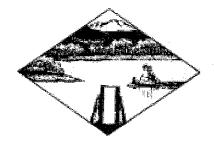

AGENDA ITEM 3 CITIZEN INPUT:

3.1 <u>Susan Wagner and Erin Emerick with Community Action Team will discuss</u> Housing Rehabilitation Loans.

Susan and Erin talked about the NW Oregon Regional Housing Rehabilitation Program Revolving Loan Fund and the loans the City currently has and the options we have. The funds are remnants of a program that was funded through a grant the City received back in the 90's. The grant funds are City specific and are for Columbia City residents. The funds are to be used towards specific housing improvement items. Council tabled this discussion for a later time. Susan and Erin also went over other programs that Community Action Team provides and left some resource guides.

3.2 <u>Judy Bright and Tina Curry with St. Helens Kiwanis will discuss creating a Columbia County Yellow Page Directory.</u> They were not present.

3.3 Karen Shervey, 2010 7th Court, discussed her concern regarding the fire hazard and limbs hanging over property lines with the trees along the property line on 2105 8th Street. She is looking for the trees to be cut down because trimming will not help. Kim explained that the City cannot tell people to cut down trees on their private property. Our Ordinance only covers if the tree is dead and poses an eminent danger to property. Jerry explained that it's going to come down to a civil issue and she will need to reach out to a

lawyer, there are not any statues or ordinances the City can use to cut down the trees on their private property. He said there is a Hazard Mitigation meeting next Wednesday and they will be discussing what different members of the committee researched and found out. Jerry also suggested talking to her insurance company for guidance. Rob stated that, reading the resources provided to him by Mr. Shervey for wildfire prevention, a lot of the recommendations they gave were communities recommending citizens undertake voluntary changes to their property and Cities were encouraged to clear dead limbs, underbrush, etc.

3.4 Logan Gilbert-Renner, 2450 5th Street, discussed City meetings being streamed. He brought forth a suggestion to just live stream the meetings instead of a high maintenance set up that is costly. He said it could be a simple set-up of a phone on a stand, which would not affect the way meetings are run and conducted, nor would it require extra staff or expensive software. He volunteered his services to help with this. Rob stated that we like the idea of transparency and getting more people involved but the concern still lies with viability of monitoring it to make sure it is being streamed properly and put out in an efficient way. Connie inquired about someone being willing to volunteer to do that. Logan said he would be willing to do it. Alex questioned if it were streamed on YouTube or Facebook, who would own the video, would the City need to create accounts to save the videos, who will maintain it. Council tabled this discussion for a later time.

Report for Period Ending September 30, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 2:00 pm by Chair, Barbara Gordon.

The September 17, 2024 minutes were read and accepted: Motion made by Rebecca Pickering, 2nd by Rob Forman, and approved unanimously.

The committee reviewed 15 checks and verified the supporting documentation. The committee requested that Rob Forman review checks online to validate signatures.

After reviewing the significant percentage increase for insurance and bonds, the committee recommends that the last five years of the yearly increases be averaged, and that the five-year rolling average increase be factored in the annual budgeting process.

The committee asked the City Administrator to follow up on the following balance sheets entries:

- The difference of 1115.51 between the Accounts payable on the September Combined balance sheet and the September Trial balance.
- The difference on the September 30 Investment and Cash Balance Summary of \$10,917.

The City Administrator reports she is still working on the email addresses.

Meeting adjourned at 3:45 pm.

Next meeting will be held on February 18, 2025 at 2:30 pm.

- Answers regarding the two balance sheet issues were received from the City Administrator on Dec 16th and are incorporated in these minutes.
- 1. There was a difference of \$1115.51 between the Accounts Payable on the September Combined Balance Sheet and the Trial Balance spreadsheet. These amounts did match when the reports were originally generated, but the difference was caused by the September Electronic Payroll Accounts Payable Batch not being closed until later.
- 2. The September cash balance sheet was off, it showed there was \$10,917 more in our general ledger than cash on hand. The difference ended up being a journal entry not being done for a loan payment that was made through the LGIP State Pool account for loan #R23551. The journal entry for the payment has been done. This leaves the September cash balance sheet off \$75, which washes out on October's cash balance sheet. It was due to \$75 in fees that were mistakenly charged by the bank at the end of the month in September to our checking account and then them reversing the fees on October 3rd.

ORDINANCE NO.	

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A FRANCHISE ("FRANCHISE") TO QWEST CORPORATION D/B/A CENTURYLINK QC ON BEHALF OF ITSELF AND ITS OPERATING AFFILIATES ("CENTURYLINK") TO OPERATE AND MAINTAIN A TELECOMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM ("SYSTEM") IN THE CITY OF COLUMBIA CITY, OREGON ("CITY").

The City of Columbia City ordains as follows:

The City hereby ordains that it is in the public interest to grant CenturyLink a Franchise to operate the System pursuant to the terms and conditions contained herein.

SECTION 1. Grant of Franchise. The City hereby grants to CenturyLink the right, privilege and authority to install, construct, maintain, operate, upgrade, repair, relocate and remove its cables and related appurtenances ("Facilities") in, under, along, over and across the present and future streets, alleys and other public ways in the City ("Public Ways", or in the singular "Public Way"), for the purpose of providing telecommunication services to the City's inhabitants and other customers of CenturyLink located within the City's corporate limits.

SECTION 2. <u>Acceptance by CenturyLink.</u> Within sixty (60) days after the passage of this Ordinance by the City, CenturyLink shall file an unqualified written acceptance thereof with the City; otherwise, the Ordinance and the rights granted herein shall be null and void.

SECTION 3. Term. The initial term of this Franchise is five (5) years commencing on the date of Acceptance by CenturyLink as set forth above in Section 2 and shall thereafter automatically renew from year-to-year unless either party gives advance written notice to the other party at least 120 days prior to expiration of the initial term or subsequent annual term requesting the parties enter into good faith discussions to reach terms of a new agreement.

SECTION 4. Records Inspection. CenturyLink shall make available to the City at a CenturyLink office, upon reasonable advance written notice of no fewer than sixty (60) days, such relevant information pertinent only to enforcing the terms of this Ordinance in such form and at such times as CenturyLink can reasonably make available. Subject to applicable laws, any information that CenturyLink provides to the City, except as otherwise provided herein, is confidential and proprietary and shall not be disclosed or used for any purpose other than verifying compliance with the terms of this Ordinance. Except as otherwise provided herein, any such information provided to the City shall be returned to CenturyLink following review, without duplication, unless CenturyLink grants the City written permission to duplicate the information.

SECTION 5. Non-Exclusive Franchise. The right to use and occupy the Public Ways shall be nonexclusive, and the City reserves the right to use the Public Ways for itself or any other entity. The City's and other entities' use, however, shall not unreasonably interfere with CenturyLink's Facilities or the rights granted CenturyLink herein.

SECTION 6. <u>City Regulatory Authority.</u> The City reserves the right to adopt such additional ordinances and regulations as may be deemed necessary in the exercise of its police power for the protection of the health, safety and welfare of its citizens consistent with applicable federal and state law. The City agrees to promptly notify CenturyLink of any such changes potentially applicable to this Franchise.

SECTION 7. Indemnification. The City shall not be liable for any property damage or loss or injury to or death of any person that occurs as the result of the construction, operation or maintenance by CenturyLink of its Facilities. CenturyLink shall indemnify, defend and hold the City harmless from and against claims, demands, liens and all liability or damage of whatsoever kind on account of CenturyLink's use of the Public Ways. The City shall: (a) give prompt written notice to CenturyLink of any such claim, demand or lien with respect to which the City seeks indemnification hereunder; and (b) permit CenturyLink to assume the defense of such claim, demand, or lien with legal counsel of CenturyLink's selection. CenturyLink shall not be subject to liability for any settlement or compromise made without its prior written consent. Notwithstanding the other provisions contained herein, CenturyLink shall in no event be required to indemnify the City for any claims, demands, or liens arising from the negligence or wrongful actions or inactions of the City, its officials, boards, commissions, agents, contractors, and/or employees.

SECTION 8. <u>Insurance Requirements.</u> CenturyLink will maintain in full force and effect for the Term of the Franchise, at CenturyLink's expense, a comprehensive liability insurance policy written by a company authorized to do business in the State of New Mexico, or will provide self-insurance reasonably satisfactory to the City, protecting it against liability for loss, personal injury and property damage occasioned by the operation of the System, including the Facilities, by CenturyLink. Such insurance will be in an amount not less than \$2,000,000.00. CenturyLink will also maintain Worker's Compensation coverage throughout the term of this Franchise as required by law. Evidence of such insurance is available at www.centurylink.com/moi.

SECTION 9. Annexation. When any territory is approved for annexation to the City, the City shall within ten (10) business days provide by certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, to CenturyLink at the addresses provided in Section 18 hereof: (a) each site address to be annexed as recorded on City assessment and tax rolls; (b) a legal description of the proposed boundary change; and (c) a copy of the City 's ordinance approving the proposed annexation.

SECTION 10. Plan, Design, Construction and Installation of CenturyLink's Facilities.

- 10.1 All Facilities under authority of this Ordinance shall be used, constructed and maintained in accordance with applicable law.
- 10.2 CenturyLink shall, prior to commencing new construction or major reconstruction work in Public Ways or other public places, apply for a permit from the City, which permit shall not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned, or delayed. CenturyLink will provide plans of new facilities to be placed in the Public Ways pursuant to a permit issued by the City. CenturyLink will abide by all applicable ordinances and reasonable rules, regulations and requirements of the City consistent with applicable law, and the City may inspect the manner of such work and require remedies as may be reasonably necessary to assure compliance. Notwithstanding the foregoing, CenturyLink shall not be obligated to obtain a permit to perform emergency repairs or for normal maintenance of its facilities.
- 10.3 To the extent practical and consistent with any permit issued by the City, all Facilities shall be located so as to cause minimum interference with the Public Ways and shall be constructed, installed, maintained, cleared of vegetation, renovated or replaced in accordance with applicable rules, ordinances and regulations of the City.
- 10.4 If, during the course of work on its Facilities, CenturyLink causes damage to or alters the Public Way or other public property, CenturyLink shall replace and restore such Public Way or public property at CenturyLink's expense to a condition reasonably comparable to the condition that existed immediately prior to such damage or alteration, normal wear and tear excepted.

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- 10.5 CenturyLink shall have the right to excavate the Public Ways subject to reasonable conditions and requirements of the City. Before installing new underground facilities or replacing existing underground facilities, CenturyLink shall first obtain a permit from the City in accordance with subsection 10.2 hereof.
- 10.6 Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to prevent the City from constructing, maintaining, repairing, or relocating its sewers, streets, water mains, sidewalks, or other public property. However, before commencing any work within a Public Way that may affect CenturyLink's Facilities, the City shall give written notice to CenturyLink, and all such work shall be done, insofar as practicable, in such a manner as not to obstruct, injure, or prevent the free use and operation of CenturyLink's poles, wires, conduits, conductors, pipes, and appurtenances.
- 10.7 CenturyLink shall not attach to, or otherwise use or commit to use, any pole owned by City until a separate pole attachment agreement has been executed by the parties.

SECTION 11. Relocation of Facilities.

- 11.1 Relocation for the City. CenturyLink shall, upon receipt of advance written notice of not fewer than thirty (30) days, protect, support, temporarily disconnect, relocate, or remove any CenturyLink property located in a Public Way when required to do so by the City for reasons of public health, safety, and welfare. However, CenturyLink shall not be required to relocate or adjust its facilities pursuant to this subsection in furtherance of non-essential, developmental, aesthetic, or beautification projects (collectively "Non-Essential Project"), except in accordance with subsection 11.2 below. CenturyLink shall be responsible for any costs associated with these obligations to the same extent as other users of the respective Public Way.
- 11.2 Relocation for a Third Party. CenturyLink shall, at the request of any person holding a lawful permit issued by the City and/or in support of a Non-Essential Project by City, protect, support, raise, lower, temporarily disconnect, relocate in or remove from Public Ways, as applicable and if possible, any CenturyLink property, provided that the cost of such action is borne by the person requesting it and CenturyLink is given reasonable advance written notice and sufficient time to take the appropriate action. In such situation, CenturyLink may also require advance payment. For purposes of this subsection, "reasonable advance written notice" shall mean no fewer than thirty (30) days for a temporary relocation, and no fewer than one hundred twenty (120) days for a permanent relocation.
- 11.3 Alternatives to Relocation. CenturyLink may, after receipt of written notice requesting a relocation of Facilities, submit to the City written alternatives to such relocation. Such alternatives shall include the use and operation of temporary transmitting facilities in adjacent Public Ways. The City shall promptly evaluate such alternatives and advise CenturyLink in writing if one or more of the alternatives are suitable. If requested by the City, CenturyLink shall promptly submit additional information to assist the City in making such evaluation. The City shall give each alternative proposed by CenturyLink full and fair consideration. In the event the City ultimately determines that there is no other reasonable alternative, CenturyLink shall relocate the Facilities as otherwise provided herein. Notwithstanding the foregoing, CenturyLink shall in all cases have the right to abandon the Facilities.
- **SECTION 12.** <u>Vegetation Management.</u> CenturyLink shall have the authority to trim trees and other growth in the Public Ways in order to access and maintain the Facilities in compliance with applicable law and industry standards.
- **SECTION 13.** <u>Payment by CenturyLink.</u> In consideration of the rights, privileges, and Franchise hereby granted, CenturyLink, its successors and assigns, shall pay the City from and after the date of the acceptance of this Franchise a privilege tax in an amount equal to seven percent (7%) of the gross revenues derived from exchange access services within the City, as defined in ORS 403.105, less net uncollectibles from such revenues, including any extension of

those City limits from time to time. Payments shall be made quarterly, for the preceding quarter, as of March 31, June 30, September 30, and December 31. Each quarterly payment will be due and payable on or before sixty (60) days after the end of each calendar quarter. Such payment made by CenturyLink shall include a sworn statement from the Chief Financial Officer or his/her designee setting forth the amount and the calculation of the payment. The statement shall detail the gross revenue subject to tax. Such payment made by CenturyLink will be accepted by the City from CenturyLink.

SECTION 14. Revocation of Franchise for Noncompliance.

- 14.1 In the event that the City believes that CenturyLink has not materially complied with the terms of the Franchise, the City shall informally discuss the matter with CenturyLink. If these discussions do not lead to resolution of the problem, the City shall notify CenturyLink in writing of the exact nature of the alleged noncompliance.
- 14.2 CenturyLink shall have thirty (30) days from receipt of the written notice described in subsection 14.1 to either respond to the City, contesting the assertion of noncompliance, or otherwise initiate reasonable steps to remedy the asserted noncompliance issue, notifying the City of the steps being taken and the projected date that they will be completed.
- 14.3 In the event that CenturyLink does not comply with subsection 14.2, above, unless the parties agree to an extension of the time provided in subsection 14.2, above, the City shall schedule a public hearing to address the asserted noncompliance issue. The City shall provide CenturyLink at least twenty (20) days' prior written notice of, and the opportunity to be heard, at the hearing.
- 14.4 Subject to applicable federal and state law, in the event the City, after the hearing set forth in subsection 14.3, determines that CenturyLink is noncompliant with this Ordinance, the City may:
 - A. Seek specific performance of any provision which reasonably lends itself to such remedy, as an alternative to damages; or
 - B. Commence an action at law for monetary damages or other equitable relief; or
 - C. In the case of substantial noncompliance with a material provision of the Ordinance, seek to revoke the Franchise in accordance with subsection 14.5.
- 14.5 Should the City seek to revoke the Franchise after following the procedures set forth above, the City shall give written notice to CenturyLink including a statement of all reasons for such revocation. CenturyLink shall have ninety (90) days from receipt of such notice to object in writing and state its reason(s) for such objection. Thereafter, the City may seek revocation of the Franchise at a public hearing. The City shall cause to be served upon CenturyLink, at least thirty (30) days prior to such public hearing, a written notice specifying the time and place of such hearing and stating its intent to revoke the Franchise. At the designated hearing, the City shall give CenturyLink an opportunity to state its position on the matter, after which the City shall determine whether or not the Franchise shall be revoked. CenturyLink may appeal the City 's determination to Columbia County Circuit Court, State of Oregon, which shall have the power to review the decision of the City de novo. Such appeal must be taken within sixty (60) days of the issuance of the City 's determination. The City may, at its sole discretion, take any lawful action which it deems appropriate to enforce its rights under this Ordinance in lieu of revocation.
- **14.6** Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions in this Section 14, CenturyLink does not waive any of its rights under applicable law.

SECTION 15. No Waiver of Rights. Neither the City nor CenturyLink shall be excused from complying with any of the terms and conditions contained herein by any failure of the other, or any of its officers, employees, or agents, upon any one or more occasions to insist upon or to seek compliance with any such terms and conditions. Each party expressly reserves any and all rights, remedies, and arguments it may have at law or equity, without limitation, and to argue, assert, and/or take any position as to the legality or appropriateness of any provision in this Ordinance that is inconsistent with State or Federal law, as may be amended.

SECTION 16. Transfer of Franchise. CenturyLink's right, title, or interest in the Franchise shall not be sold, transferred, assigned, or otherwise encumbered without prior notice to and prior approval by the City, such approval not to be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed. Notwithstanding the foregoing, when said sale, transfer, assignment, or encumbrance is to an entity controlling, controlled by, or under common control with CenturyLink, or for any rights, title, or interest of CenturyLink in the Franchise or Facilities in order to secure indebtedness, or to an entity that acquires substantially all the assets or equity of CenturyLink by sale, merger, consolidation or reorganization, approval by the City shall not be required.

SECTION 17. <u>Amendment.</u> Amendments to the terms and conditions contained herein shall be mutually agreed upon in writing by the City and CenturyLink and formally adopted by the City Council as an ordinance amendment.

SECTION 18. <u>Notices.</u> Any notice required or permitted to be given hereunder shall be deemed sufficient if given by a communication in writing and shall be deemed to have been received upon actual receipt or refusal of delivery if sent by (a) personal delivery, (b) United States Mail, postage prepaid, certified, return receipt requested, or (c) nationally recognized overnight courier, and addressed to the Parties as set forth below:

SECTION 19. <u>Severability</u>. If any section, sentence, paragraph, term or provision hereof is for any reason determined to be illegal, invalid, or superseded by other lawful authority, including any state or federal regulatory

authority having appropriate jurisdiction thereof, or unconstitutional, illegal or invalid by any court having appropriate jurisdiction thereof, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and independent provision, and such determination shall have no effect on the validity of any other section, sentence, paragraph, term or provision hereof, all of which will remain in full force and effect for the term of the Franchise or any renewal or renewals thereof.

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AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A NON-EXCLUSIVE GAS UTILITY FRANCHISE TO NORTHWEST NATURAL GAS COMPANY, AND FIXING TERMS, CONDITIONS AND COMPENSATION OF SUCH FRANCHISE AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 14-683-O and 14-687-O.

THE CITY OF COLUMBIA CITY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Definitions and Explanations.

- 1. As used in this Ordinance.
 - a. "Bridge" includes a structure erected within the City to facilitate the crossing of a river, stream, ditch, ravine or other place, but does not include a culvert.
 - b. "City" means the City of Columbia City and the areas within its boundaries, including its boundaries as extended in the future.
 - c. "Council" means the legislative body of the City.
 - d. "Gas Mains" includes all gas transmission and distribution facilities located on or under any Street, Bridge or Public Place within the City.
 - e. "Grantee" means the corporation referred to in Section 2 of this Ordinance.
 - f. "Gross Revenue" means revenue received from the use of the gas utility system within the City limits less related net uncollectibles. Gross Revenue shall be computed by deducting from the total billings of the Grantee: (a) the total net write-off of uncollectible accounts; (b) revenues paid directly by the United States of America or any of its agencies; (c) sales of gas at wholesale by the Grantee to any public utility or public agency where the public utility or public agency purchasing such gas is not the ultimate consumer; (d) public purpose charges, provided that such charges or surcharges are required or authorized by federal or state statute, administrative rule, or by tariff approved by the Oregon Public Utility Commission (OPUC) and raise revenue used solely for a public purpose and not to compensate Grantee for the sale or use of natural gas or for the use, rental, or lease of Grantee's Gas Facilities in the City; and, (e) revenues derived from the sale or transportation of gas supplied under an interruptible tariff schedule to a customer, where the customer receives gas under such schedule as of the effective date of this Franchise. Public purpose activities include, but are not limited to, energy efficiency programs, market transformation programs, lowincome energy efficiency programs, and carbon offset programs designed to benefit residential and commercial customers within Grantee's service territory in Oregon. The Grantee may offset against such compensation the amount of any

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license, permit or other fees paid to the City in connection with the Grantee's use of the Streets, Bridges and Public Places of the City.

- g. "Person" includes an individual, corporation, association, firm, partnership and joint stock company.
- h. "Public Place" includes any city-owned park, place or grounds within the City that is open to the public but does not include a Street or Bridge.
- i. "Qualified Contractor" means a person that is knowledgeable about the construction and operation of a natural gas transmission and distribution system, and must be subject to and comply with the qualifying standards as it relates to the work in question, set forth in 49 CFR Part 192, Subpart N Qualification of Pipeline personnel. Additionally, this person must adhere to all applicable requirements of NW Natural's Quality Assurance program and Contractor Management group.
- j. "Street" includes a public Street, alley, avenue, road, boulevard, thoroughfare or public highway within the City, but does not include a Bridge.
- 2. As used in this Ordinance, the singular number may include the plural and the plural number may include the singular.

Section 2. Rights Granted.

Subject to the conditions and reservations contained in this Ordinance, the City hereby grants to NORTHWEST NATURAL GAS COMPANY, a corporation, the right, privilege and franchise to:

- 1. Construct, maintain and operate a gas utility system within the City.
- 2. Install, maintain and operate on and under the Streets and Bridges and Public Places of the City, facilities for the transmission and distribution of gas to the City and its inhabitants and to other customers and territory beyond the limits of the City; and
- 3. Transmit, distribute and sell gas.

Section 3. Use of Streets, Bridges and Public Places by Grantee.

1. Before the Grantee may use or occupy any Street, Bridge or Public Place, the Grantee shall first obtain permission from the City to do so and shall comply with any special conditions the City desires to impose on such use or occupation.

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The compensation paid by the Grantee for this Franchise includes all
compensation for the use of Streets, Bridges and Public Places located within the
City as authorized.

Section 4. Duration.

This Franchise is granted for a period of 10 years from and after the Effective Date of this Ordinance.

Section 5. Franchise Not Exclusive.

This Franchise is not exclusive, and shall not be construed as a limitation on the City in:

- 1. Granting rights, privileges and authority to other persons similar to or different from those granted by this Ordinance.
- 2. Constructing, installing, maintaining or operating any City-owned public utility.

Section 6. Public Works and Improvements Not Affected by Franchise.

The City reserves the right to:

- 1. Construct, install, maintain and operate any public improvement, work or facility;
- 2. Do any work that the City may find desirable on, over or under any Street, Bridge or Public Place.
- 3. Vacate, alter or close any Street, Bridge or Public Place. In the event that utilities have already been installed, City shall make available to Grantee an alternative right-of-way for the location of its facilities.
- 4. Whenever the City shall excavate or perform any work in any of the present and future Streets, alleys and Public Places of the City, or shall contract, or issue permits, for such excavation or work where such excavation or work may disturb Grantee's Gas Mains, pipes and appurtenances, the City shall, in writing, notify Grantee sufficiently in advance of such contemplated excavation or work to enable Grantee to take such measures as may be deemed necessary to protect such Gas Mains, pipes and appurtenances from damage and possible inconvenience or injury to the public. In any such case, the Grantee, upon request, shall furnish maps or drawings to the City or contractor, as the case may be, showing the approximate location of all its structures in the area involved in such proposed excavation or other work.
- 5. Whenever the City shall vacate any Street or Public Place for the convenience or benefit of any Person or governmental agency or instrumentality, Grantee's rights under this Franchise shall be preserved as to any of its facilities then existing in such Street or Public Place.

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Section 7. Continuous Service.

The Grantee shall maintain and operate an adequate system for the distribution of gas in the City. The Grantee shall use due diligence to maintain continuous and uninterrupted 24-hour a day service which shall at all times conform at least to the standards common in the business and to the applicable standards adopted by federal and state authorities and to standards of the City which are not in conflict with those adopted by the federal and state authorities. Under no circumstances shall the Grantee be liable for an interruption or failure of service caused by act of God, unavoidable accident or other circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee through no fault of its own.

Section 8. Safety Standards and Work Specifications.

- 1. The facilities of the Grantee shall at all times be maintained in a safe, substantial and workmanlike manner.
- 2. For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Section, the City may provide such specifications relating thereto as may be necessary or convenient for public safety or the orderly development of the City. The City may amend and add to such specifications from time to time.

Section 9. Control of Construction.

The Grantee shall file with the City or otherwise provide access to maps showing the location of any construction, extension or relocation of its Gas Mains in the Streets of the City and shall obtain from the City approval of the location and plans prior to commencement of the work. The City may require the Grantee to obtain a permit before commencing the construction, extension or relocation of any of its Gas Mains.

Section 10. Street Excavations and Restorations.

- 1. Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, the Grantee may make necessary excavations for the purpose of constructing, installing, maintaining and operating its facilities. Except in emergencies, and in the performance of routine service connections and ordinary maintenance, on private property, prior to making an excavation in the traveled portion of any Street, Bridge or Public Place, and, when required by the City, in any untraveled portion of any Street, Bridge, or any Public Place, the Grantee shall obtain from the City approval of the proposed excavation and of its location. Grantee shall give notice to the City by telephone, electronic data transmittal or other appropriate means prior to the commencement of service or maintenance work and as soon as is practicable after the commencement of work performed under emergency conditions.
- 2. When any excavation is made by the Grantee, the Grantee shall promptly restore the affected portion of the Street, Bridge or Public Place to the same condition in which it was prior to the excavation. The restoration shall be in compliance with

specifications, requirements, and regulations of the City in effect at the time of such restoration. If the Grantee fails to restore promptly the affected portion of a Street, Bridge or Public Place to the same condition in which it was prior to the excavation, the City may make the restoration, and the reasonable cost thereof shall be paid by the Grantee.

Section 11. Location and Relocation of Facilities.

- 1. All facilities of the Grantee shall be placed so that they do not interfere unreasonably with the use by the City and the public of the Streets, Bridges and Public Places and in accordance with any specifications adopted by the City governing the location of facilities.
- 2. The City may require, in the public interest, the removal or relocation of facilities maintained by the Grantee in the Streets of the City, and the Grantee shall remove and relocate such facilities within a reasonable time after receiving notice to do so from the City. The cost of such removal or relocation of its facilities shall be paid by the Grantee, but when such removal or relocation is required for the convenience or benefit of any person, governmental agency or instrumentality other than the City, Grantee shall be entitled to reimbursement for the reasonable cost thereof from such person, agency or instrumentality. The City shall provide the Grantee with timely notice of any anticipated requirement to remove or relocate its facilities and shall cooperate with the Grantee in the matter of assigning or allocating the costs of removal or relocation.

Section 12. Compensation.

- 1. As compensation for the Franchise granted by this Ordinance, the Grantee shall pay to the City an amount equal to five percent (5%) or the maximum percentage allowed by the state, of the Gross Revenue collected by the Grantee from its customers for gas consumed within the City.
- 2. The compensation required by this Section shall be due for each calendar year, or fraction thereof, within sixty (60) days after the close of such calendar year, or fraction thereof. Within sixty (60) days after the termination of this Franchise, compensation shall be paid for the period elapsing since the close of the last calendar year for which compensation has been paid.
- 3. The Grantee shall furnish to the City with each payment of compensation required by this Section a statement showing the amount of Gross Revenue of the Grantee within the City for the period covered by the payment computed on the basis set out in subsection (1) of this Section. The compensation for the period covered by the statement shall be computed on the basis of the Gross Revenue so reported. If the Grantee fails to pay the entire amount of the compensation due the City through error or otherwise, the difference due the City shall be paid by the Grantee within thirty (30) days from discovery of the error or determination of the

- correct amount. Any overpayment to the City through error or otherwise, shall be offset against the next payment due from the Grantee.
- 4. Acceptance by the City of any payment due under this Section shall not be deemed to be a waiver by the City of any breach of this Franchise occurring prior thereto, nor shall the acceptance by the City of any such payments preclude the City from later establishing that a larger amount was actually due, or from collecting any balance due to the City.

Section 13. Book of Account and Reports.

The Grantee shall keep accurate books of account at an office in Oregon for the purpose of determining the amounts due to the City under Section 12 of this Ordinance. Upon reasonable notice, the City may inspect the books of account at any time during business hours and may audit the books from time to time. The Council may require periodic reports from the Grantee relating to its operations and revenues within the City. Franchise Fees paid by Grantee shall be subject to audit or financial review by the City, provided that only payments that occurred or should have occurred during a period of thirty-six (36) months prior to the date the City notifies the Grantee of its intent to perform an audit or financial review are reviewable. However, NW Natural will not provide the City with records containing customer information that identifies or can be attributed to a specific customer, without a written legal opinion by the City that such records will not be subject to public disclosure under state law, and that the City will inform NW Natural and oppose their disclosure should a public disclosure request be made.

Section14. Supplying Maps Upon Request

The Grantee shall maintain on file, at an office in Oregon, maps and data pertaining to its operations in the City. Upon reasonable notice, the City may inspect the maps and data at any time, during business hours. Upon request of the City, the Grantee shall furnish to the City, without charge and on a current basis, maps showing the location of the Gas Mains of the Grantee in the City. Grantee and the City may determine that the location of certain Gas Facilities should be confidential as the public interest may require. In such a case, Grantee is under no obligation to provide records of the location of these facilities to the City and the City shall treat any public record disclosing the location of these facilities as confidential, subject to the provisions of state law and the Oregon Public Records Law. The City shall limit access to any such confidential record to trustworthy employees of the City with a need to know the information set out in the record. The City shall store any such confidential record in a secure and private place and avoid making and distributing copies of the record.

Section 15. Indemnification.

The Grantee shall indemnify and save harmless the City and its elected officials, officers, agents and employees from any and all loss, cost and expense, including attorney fees, arising from damage to property and/or injury to, or death of, persons due to any wrongful or negligent act or omission of the Grantee, its agents or employees in exercising the rights, privileges and franchise hereby granted.

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Section 16. Assignment of Franchise.

This Franchise binds and benefits the permissible successors, legal representatives and assigns of the Grantee. No assignment of the Franchise shall be effective without the written approval of the City Council of City of Columbia City. The Council may condition that approval upon a reasonable adjustment to the rate of compensation under Section 12 of this Franchise except if a sale, lease, mortgage, assignment, merger, transfer of change in control of Grantee's Gas Facilities located within the City is subject to review and approval by the OPUC, in which case the City shall accept final approval by the OPUC of such sale, lease, mortgage, assignment, merger, transfer or change of control. Nothing in this Franchise requires the City's consent for any sale, lease, mortgage, assignment, merger or other transfer to entities that control, are controlled by, or are under common control with Grantee, so long as the entity is subject to substantially the same regulations of the OPUC as Grantee in relation to the Gas Facilities within the City. If the City's consent to an assignment or transfer of the Franchise is required under this Section, the transfer or assignment shall not be effective until the assignee or transferee has complied with the requirements in Section 7 and filed a signed acceptance of the terms of this Franchise.

Section 17. Termination of Franchise for Cause.

The City may terminate this Franchise as provided in this Section, subject to Grantee's right to a court review of the reasonableness of such action, upon the negligent or willful failure of the Grantee to perform promptly and completely each and every material term, condition or obligation imposed upon it under or pursuant to this Ordinance. The City shall provide the Grantee written notice of any such failure and the Grantee shall have sixty (60) days from receipt of notice to cure such failure, or if such failure cannot reasonably be cured within sixty (60) days, to commence and diligently pursue curing such failure. Notice to Grantee required by this Section shall be sent by U.S. mail via registered or certified postage prepaid or by express mail or overnight courier as follows: Northwest Natural Gas Company, Legal Department — Franchises, 250 SW Taylor Street, Portland, Oregon 97204.

Section 18. Remedies Not Exclusive, When Requirement Waived.

All remedies and penalties under this Ordinance, including termination of the Franchise, are cumulative, and the recovery or enforcement of one is not a bar to the recovery or enforcement of any other such remedy or penalty. The remedies and penalties contained in this Ordinance, including termination of the Franchise, are not exclusive and the City reserves the right to enforce the penal provisions of any ordinance or resolution and to avail itself of any and all remedies available at law or in equity. Failure to enforce shall not be construed as a waiver of a breach of any term, condition or obligation imposed upon the Grantee by or pursuant to this Ordinance. A specific waiver of a particular breach of any term, condition or obligation imposed upon the Grantee by or pursuant to this Ordinance shall not be a waiver of any other or subsequent or future breach of the same or of any other term, condition or obligation, or a waiver of the term, condition or obligation itself.

Section 19. Expiration.

At the end of the Franchise term, if the City and Grantee are negotiating another franchise and have not concluded their negotiations, Grantee's rights and responsibilities shall be controlled by this Franchise until the City grants a new franchise and Grantee accepts it or until the City notifies Grantee that the Franchise will not be renewed.

Section 20. Confidentiality.

When requested by Grantee, and subject to the provisions of state law and the Oregon Public Records Law, the City shall treat as confidential any public record or information provided by Grantee and designated by Grantee as confidential.

Section 21. Acceptance.

The Grantee shall, within thirty (30) days from the date this Ordinance takes effect, file with the City its written unconditional acceptance of this Franchise, and if the Grantee fails to do so, this Ordinance shall be void.

Section 22. Repeal.
