







While Columbia City enjoys a very low Crimes Against Persons rate, 2014 through 2016 saw an increase which was similar in scope to the national average.

Much like Persons Crimes, Columbia City possesses a low Property Crime rate. 2014 through 2015 saw increases due to single incidents with multiple victims.





Quality of Life Call Examples: Nuisance Calls; Animal Complaints; Public Assists; Hazard Calls; Disabled Vehicles; Traffic and Parking Complaints; Code Enforcement; and Noise Complaints.

Calls for Service include all other calls which do not fall into criminal or quality of life call types. Examples of these types of incidents include Suspicious Persons and/or Vehicle Calls, Assistance to Outside Agencies, Welfare Checks, and Referrals to Outside Support Agencies such as social services.

RECYCLING UPDATE

Recent China-induced market disruptions for recycled items have spurred garbage service rate increases and forced reductions in recycling contaminations. Please do your part to reduce contaminants in your recycling

bin! The following contaminants are commonly found in recycling bins, and these items are *NOT* permitted! These items contaminate curbside recycling. Please keep all of these items out of your recycling can!

NO plastic bags or film! Plastic bags and film jam equipment at the sorting facility and create slow downs in processing. Removing the film from the processing equipment is difficult and dangerous! Plastic grocery bags are accepted for recycling at many local grocery stores, or should otherwise be disposed of in the trash.

NO plastic clamshells! There is no current recycling market for this material. Processors receiving a high level of these contaminants can potentially reject entire loads of recycling. Dispose of clam shells in the trash.

NO food residue! Food residue can cause the processor to reject materials. Food residue can also leak onto and contaminate other materials in the recycling.

NO styrofoam! Styrofoam breaks up into small pieces and contaminates other recycling. Dispose of styrofoam in the trash.

NO napkins and paper towels! Napkins and paper towels can contain food and liquid which contaminates other recyclables. Dispose of napkins and paper towels in the trash.

Before attending the event, please review these <u>IMPORTANT</u> transportation and parking instructions:

Free bus service will be offered to and from the event! To catch the bus, park near the Caples House Museum, Community Hall or City Hall, or park at the CC Rider Park 'n Ride in St. Helens, and be bussed directly to the park! Bus service will start at 10 am.

Parking near the Veterans Park is **NOT RECOMMENDED.**

Vehicular access to the park from Highway 30 will be **PROHIBITED** on event day.

Parking along Highway 30 on event day will be **PROHIBITED.**

Refreshments will be available, compliments of the Daughters of the American Revolution, Mt. St. Helens Chapter.

BUDGET COMMITTEE MEETING SET

The Columbia City Budget Committee will meet on Thursday, May 24th, 2018 at 6 pm in the Council Chambers at City Hall. The purpose of the meeting is to receive comments from the public about the proposed budget. A copy of the proposed budget document may be inspected or obtained on or after May 18, 2018, at City Hall. Any person may appear at the meeting and discuss the proposed budget.

BUDGET COMMITTEE VACANCY

We currently have a vacancy on the Columbia City Budget Committee. The Budget Committee meets at least once annually to review the proposed budget, hear public testimony, and approve a budget for submission to the City Council. Budget Committee terms are for a period of three years. Applicants must reside within the

City. If interested, please inquire at City Hall.

CODE ENFORCEMENT REMINDERS

Keep grass and weeds cut: Between April 15th and September 30th weeds and grass cannot exceed 10 inches in height within the City limits.

RV, boat, trailer parking/storage:

- Within the right-of-way: Recreational vehicles, boats, and trailers may be parked temporarily on an improved public street for no more than five consecutive days if currently licensed and
 - registered and not blocking traffic or obscuring the visibility of an intersection, crosswalk, or a traffic



crosswalk, or a traffic control sign or device. The same rules apply to the undeveloped right-of-way, unless authorized by an approved Exception Permit. Exception permits and guidelines are available at City Hall or online. Storage on an approved driveway within the right-of-way may occur, provided storage is parked no less than six feet from the edge of the paved street, does not obstruct views of traffic or create a dangerous or hazardous condition, and is maintained in accordance with the maintenance standards outlined in Ordinance 504.

Upon private property: The legal owner of the storage must reside upon the property. Parking and storage within the front yard setback is limited to paved or graveled areas. Storage is limited to one unit that is designed for human occupancy.

CANDIDATE FILING DATES

Voters will fill the position of Mayor and two City Council positions during the November 6, 2018, General Election. Qualified electors who have resided within the



City since November 6, 2017, may run for office. Nominating petitions will be available at the City Hall beginning May 30, 2018. The nominating petitions must be signed by 20 qualified electors, and candidates must submit the signature sheets to the City Administrator/Recorder for verification allowing sufficient time for the verification process to be completed prior to the August 28, 2018 filing deadline. The positions are for a term of four years.
