COUGAR REPORTS

We recently received a report of a cougar sighting in the area Sixth and E Streets in Columbia City. If you spot a cougar in Columbia City, please IMMEDIATELY call 9-



1-1 to report the incident. After the sighting, please leave paw prints and other signs undisturbed until authorities arrive.

Identifying characteristics: Adults of both sexes have light tan coats and long black-tipped tails, with black coloration on the backs of their ears. Adult males may exceed 8 feet in length, from nose to tail, and weigh between 130 and 170 pounds. Adult females can be 7 feet long from nose to tail and weigh between 75 and 105 pounds.

Safety precautions: The potential for human/cougar interactions has increased in recent years. However, more people are injured or killed by deer, bees, dogs and spiders than by cougars. If you are concerned about safety, familiarize yourself with the signs of cougar and their habitat and follow these suggestions:

- Keep an eye on your children. Don't let your children play unattended in the backyard, especially when cougars are known to be in the area. You also want to keep your children away from dense brush, which the cougar may use for cover.
- Be cautious at dusk and dawn. Contrary to popular belief, most predators are most active at dusk and dawn. This is a time to be especially cautious.
- **Don't leave food or garbage outside.** The strong smell of food or garbage may attract a cougar into your yard.
- Keep your pets indoors. While you may have left your pet in the backyard in the past, you may want to start bringing it indoors with a cougar in the area. Cougars can easily kill the largest dog and leaving your pet out may prompt an attack. Don't feed pets outside as this can attract cougars and their prey.
- **Don't feed wildlife.** By feeding deer, raccoons or other wildlife in your yard, you may inadvertently attract cougars, which prey on them as a food source.
- **Do not hike alone.** Go in groups, with adults supervising children.

CITY RESERVOIR AND WATERLINE PROJECT

The City Council approved a construction contract with PCR, Inc., after having gone through the formal bid process, for the Columbia City 2019 Water System Improvements Project at the March 7, 2019 Council Meeting. This project, funded through grants from FEMA/OEM and loans through the Business Oregon Program, will improve waterline function and efficiency along The Strand and First Street areas, as well as refurbishing and making necessary seismic upgrades to our City's water reservoirs. Citizens should expect to see construction operations starting within these areas in the coming weeks.

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MEMORIAL DAY CEREMONY COLUMBIA CITY VETERANS PARK

Please join us in honoring all American veterans on Monday, May 27 from 11 am to noon at the Columbia City Veterans Park.



Before attending the event, please review these <u>IMPORTANT</u> transportation and parking instructions:

Free bus service will be offered to and from the event! To catch the bus, park near the Caples House Museum, Community Hall or City Hall, or park at the CC Rider Park 'n Ride in St. Helens, and be bussed directly to the park! Bus service will start at 9:30 am.

Parking near the Veterans Park is <u>NOT</u> <u>RECOMMENDED.</u>

Vehicular access to the park from Highway 30 will be *PROHIBITED* on event day.

Parking along Highway 30 on event day will be **PROHIBITED.**

Refreshments will be available, compliments of the Daughters of the American Revolution, Mt. St. Helens Chapter.

STILL TIME TO GET BRICKS FOR THE VETERANS PARK MEMORIAL WALL

In May we have our annual Memorial Day event at



the Veterans Park. There are a limited number of bricks available on our 5th and final wall. If purchased by Monday, May 13th they will be engraved before the event.

You can also purchase a brick in support of the Park or as a sponsor. These bricks are located at the base of any of the walls.

All bricks are \$75.00. Forms are available online at the City's website or at City Hall.

CODE ENFORCEMENT REMINDERS

Keep grass and weeds cut: Between April 15th and September 30th weeds and grass cannot exceed 10 inches in height within the City limits.

RV, boat, trailer parking/storage:

• Within the right-of-way: Recreational vehicles, boats, and trailers may be parked temporarily on an improved public street for no more than five consecutive days if currently licensed and

registered and not blocking traffic or obscuring the visibility of an intersection, crosswalk, or a traffic



control sign or device. The same rules apply to the undeveloped right-of-way, unless authorized by an approved Exception Permit. Exception permits and guidelines are available at City Hall or online. Storage on an approved driveway within the right-of-way may occur, provided storage is parked no less than six feet from the edge of the paved street, does not obstruct views of traffic or create a dangerous or hazardous condition, and is maintained in accordance with the maintenance standards outlined in Ordinance 504.

• **Upon private property:** The legal owner of the storage must reside upon the property. Parking and storage within the front yard setback is limited to paved or graveled areas. Storage is limited to one unit that is designed for human occupancy.
