LOWER COLUMBIA CITY PROJECT UPDATE

We would, first, like to thank all of our citizens who have been affected with our ongoing Water Systems Improvements Project in the lower Columbia City area for their patience and understanding during this project. Approximately 3,500 feet of waterline has been replaced, along with fire hydrants and other critical infrastructure upgrades. We realize the imposition and frustration

that water shutoffs. planned both and unplanned. have caused and want to let know that we vou greatly appreciate your tolerance with the



impositions and problems that have occurred.

Waterline installations and seismic upgrades to our lower reservoir have been finished, and the contractor will next be completing street patching, paving restoration on Front Place, site clean up, and inspections; starting on September 10, 2019 and completing on September 19, 2019. After these final steps are finished paving operations for The Strand will be scheduled and conducted. The areas of First Street that were impacted by the construction project will also be reviewed in order to develop an appropriate work plan to address any paving that may be needed.




BIG THANK YOU!! UNITED WAY – STUFF THE BUS

CENSUS IN TOWN

Census Bureau workers in our area may be verifying addresses in preparation for the 2020 Census.

How can I verify that an in-person interviewer is a Census Bureau employee?

If you are visited by someone from the U.S. Census Bureau, here are some ways to verify the individual is a Census Bureau employee:

- The field representative must present an ID badge which contains:
 - Their name,
 - their photograph,
 - a Department of Commerce watermark, and
 - an expiration date.
- A field representative will be carrying an official bag with the Census Bureau logo or a laptop for conducting the survey.
- The field representative will provide you with a letter from the Census Bureau on official letterhead stating why they are visiting your residence.
- Upon request, the field representative will provide you with their supervisor's contact information and/or the phone number for your Census Bureau Regional Office. The Regional Office supervises the activities of all field representatives in your area.

If you wish to confirm that the person at your door is a Census Bureau employee, you can contact the **Regional Office** for your state at 1-800-992-3530.

CODE ENFORCEMENT REMINDERS

Keep grass and weeds cut! Between April 15 and September 30 of any year, weeds and grass cannot exceed 10-inches in height and blackberry bushes cannot extend across property lines or into the City right-of-ways, streets, alleys and sidewalks.

Animals at Large: It is unlawful to allow animals to

run at large upon public streets or private property other than your own. This includes cats, dogs, goats, chickens, and all other animals. Animals running at large may be impounded, and the owners may be subject to a fine.



WILDFIRE PREPAREDNESS

Increasing numbers of people are making their homes in the woodland settings, rural areas, or remote mountain sites. These residents face the danger of wildfires. Wildfires often begin unnoticed, however, they spread very quickly. Reduce your risk by preparing now - before wildfire strikes. Meet with your family to decide what to do and where to go if wildfires threaten your area.



Causes of wildfire:

- Droughts and dry conditions throughout various times of the year increase the risk of wildfires.
- Careless use of fire in highly wooded or grassy areas dramatically increases the chance of a wildfire, which can then quickly spread across trees and dry brush and threaten homes and businesses in the vicinity.

Practice wildfire safety and plan ahead:

 Contact your local fire department, health department, or forestry office for information on fire laws.

- Make sure that fire vehicles can get to your home.
- Clearly mark all driveway entrances and display your house number or address.
- Set aside household items that can be used as fire tools. You may need to fight small fires before emergency responders arrive.
- Select building materials and plants that resist fire.
- Regularly clean roofs and gutters.
- Plan several escape routes away from your home - by car and by foot.
- Select a family meeting place outside of your neighborhood in case you cannot get home or need to evacuate.
- Talk to your neighbors about wildfire safety. Plan how the neighborhood could work together after a wildfire. Make plans to take care of children who may be on their own if parents can't get home.
- Local phone service may not be available identify someone out of the area to contact.
- Report hazardous conditions that could cause a wildfire.
- Monitor <u>http://wildfire.oregonforestry.wpengine.com/</u> for daily wildfire alerts.

BE PREPARED WITH AN EMERGENCY KIT

Have an emergency kit available and ready to go. Consider these items for your emergency kit:

- "Special needs" items for the family, such as formula and supplies for infants, items for older people, or special items for those with disabilities.
- ✓ First aid supplies.
- Prescription meds for members of the household.
- ✓ Flashlight and battery powered radio.
- Sleeping bag and extra shoes.



- ✓ Water and food. A
- gallon of water per person per day. Canned and dried foods are easy to store.
- ✓ Tools (duct tape, garbage bags, manual can opener, hammer, screwdrivers, scissors, etc.)
- ✓ Cash.
- ✓ Cell phone if available.
- ✓ Snacks.
- ✓ Reading materials and games.
- ✓ Pet supplies.
- ✓ Towels.

Be sure that you and your family members know how to Shelter-In-Place!

What Shelter-in-Place Means: One of the instructions you may be given in an emergency where hazardous materials may have been released into the atmosphere is to shelter-in-place. This is a precaution aimed to keep you safe and at times when an evacuation would be more risky. (This is not the same thing as going to a shelter in case of a storm.) Shelter-in-place means selecting a small, interior room, with no or few windows, and taking refuge there. It does not mean sealing off your entire home or office building.

Why You Might Need to Shelter-in-Place: Chemical, biological or radiological contaminants may be released accidentally, by a truck or facility, or intentionally by a





terrorist. The noxious airborne contaminants may be blowing in your direction. Should this occur, information will be provided by local authorities, by television and radio stations, by telephone call through the Columbia Alert Network (CAN), and by social media technologies on how to protect you and your family. The important thing is for you to follow the instructions of local authorities and know what to do if they advise you to shelter-in-place. Keep a television and radio on to receive further information and instructions.

How to Shelter-in-Place

- Close and lock all windows and exterior doors.
- If you are told there is danger of explosion, close the window shades, blinds or curtains.
- Turn off all fans, heating and air conditioning systems.
- Close the fireplace damper.
- Get your family disaster supplies kit and make sure the radio is working.



- Go to an interior room without windows that's above ground level. In the case of a chemical threat, an above-ground location is preferable because some chemicals are heavier than air, and may seep into basements even if the windows are closed.
- Bring your pets with you, and be sure to bring additional food and water supplies for them.
- It is ideal to have a hard-wired telephone in the room you select. Call your emergency contact and have the phone available if you need to report a life-threatening condition.
- If possible, you may want to use duct tape and plastic sheeting (heavier than food wrap) to seal any large cracks around the door and any vents into the room. This is only an extra precaution.
- Keep listening to your radio or television until you are told all is safe or you are told to evacuate. Local officials may call for evacuation in specific areas at greatest risk in your community.

Local officials on the scene are the best source of information for your particular situation. Following their instructions during and after emergencies regarding sheltering, food, water and clean up methods is your safest choice.

CC RIDER BACK IN COLUMBIA CITY

Starting on Tuesday September 3, 2019 Columbia



County Rider (CCR) will add stops in Columbia City to their Line 3 Flex route. The addition of these stops bring CCR back into Columbia City after a multi-year hiatus, and is intended to offer

public transportation as an option for our citizens who may need transportation assistance. CCR buses will make stops at the following locations:

- Second Street and I Street;
- Second Street and E Street;
- A Street near the Columbia City Mini Mart; and
- Sixth Street and E Street.

OREGON DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION EMERGENCY TEST MESSAGE NOTIFICATIONS

Effective August 5, 2019, ODOT will be offering SMS/Text Message notifications for Motor Carrier emergency alerts. This type of alert will include incidents such as fires, severe weather, and other types of emergencies that can affect motor carriers.

This alert service will **not** be used for planned road closures, detours or maintenance/construction activities, or other unplanned events.

To enroll in the emergency updates, follow the instructions below.

- Go to: <u>https://public.govdelivery.com/accounts/OR</u> <u>DOT/subscriber/new</u>. Click the drop-down to select SMS/Text Message.
- 2. Enter your full mobile phone number and click submit.
- 3. Click on the plus box next to the Motor Carrier Transportation Division (MCTD) subscription topic.
- 4. Select MCTD Emergency Notifications by checking the box and click submit.

AVOID LATE FEES – BANK CHECKS

When paying your water bill by a bank check, it is important to make sure the City's mailing address is correct. If it isn't, there is a risk it will be returned to the bank causing a delay in payment and possibly a late fee.

Be sure they are addressed to: **PO Box 189**, **Columbia City, OR 97018**.

It is also important when paying by a bank check to allow enough time for us to receive and post the payment to avoid late fees! Unpaid accounts are subject to late fees on the 26th of the month.

FREE WATER CONSERVATION KITS

The City has free water conservation kits available to water customers while supplies last. Kits include

a moisture meter, leak detection dye tablets and a deluxe water efficient hose nozzle. Limit one kit per water customer, while supplies last
