

CAPLES HOUSE RECEIVES AWARD

The Caples House Museum Complex is owned and operated by the Oregon State Society Daughters of the American Revolution. The centerpiece of the museum complex is Charles and Lucinda's home which was built in 1870 on top of Charles' father's 1846 log cabin foundation.

The house is listed on the National Register of Historic Places for its association with the broad pattern of development of the community of Columbia City during the late 19th century and for its direct association with the development of health care in the community with the town's first physician, Dr. Charles Caples.

Major issues like peeling lead paint, exterior wall dry rot, a crumbling, cracking and uneven foundation allowing moisture inside which threatened artifacts and a front porch with dry rot were all items that started the Caples House Restoration Project in 2015 with the hopes of fixing the extreme deterioration of this historic museum.



The project took 5 years of planning and fundraising in order to complete the restoration work. The project raised \$150,000 and received an Oregon Heritage grant.

The restoration project earned one of the 2021 Oregon Heritage Excellence Awards from the Oregon Heritage Commission. Congratulations!



Beach area at the Clearwater Paper Corporation pier, Vancouver Security has been hired and will be monitoring the activity in

the area and preventing people from trespassing on the pier and dolphins associated with the operations at the Clearwater Paper Corporation. They will not be handling any issues outside of the Clearwater property. All other issues relating to the beach and surrounding areas should be reported to Columbia County Dispatch at non-emergency 503-397-1521 or 911 for all emergency calls. During the month of June, we have completed 10 new written reports, and responded to the following calls: 1 assist fire, 4 animal complaints, 6 audible alarms, 7 assist persons, 3 disturbance/fights, 1 cold fraud, 12 follow-ups, 3 information calls, 2 juvenile custody disputes, 2 noise complaints, 3 parking complaints, 35 premise checks, 7 traffic stops, 6 traffic complaints, 1 suspicious circumstance, 5 suspicious persons, 2 suicide threats and 30 vacation checks; all in support of the agency's community policing programs and initiatives. In total we handled 135 activities for the month of June, 2021.

The "Columbia" is a mighty river...**that answers only to those who wear life jackets**. Every summer brings children and adults to the river, every ship brings a wake, and every wake brings powerful churns and plunders. Long after a ship goes by and is out of sight, a wake can pull people under, and if they are not wearing a life jacket, chances of being able to save them

decrease. Each season, while rowing my rowboat, I see children without life jackets - running around on the sand and wading in the water with parents who are watching from a distance. I stop to educate them on how dangerous it is to be anywhere close to the water



without wearing a life jacket and how quickly the water can pull people under regardless of how well they can swim. Every year people drown on the Columbia River. Wear life jackets in boats, wear life jackets by/or in the river, put life jackets on children, and when ships go by, bring children up until you see the last wake.

The Columbia is a mighty river that needs "CHILDREN IN LIFE JACKETS."
