Daylight Saving Time. We are soon approaching the time change on November 7th 2021. With this time change comes changes in driving conditions during your commute home and around town. It will be much darker and more difficult to see pedestrians, and other road hazards. Please adjust your driving accordingly by slowing down, looking further ahead, and giving yourself more time to brake as you approach intersections and stop lights.

During the month of September we have completed 11 new written reports and responded to the following calls: 5 audible alarms, 8 animal complaints, 2 assist outside agencies, 2 assist persons, 1 cold burglary, 1 civil call, 2 criminal mischiefs, 1 death investigation, 3 DHS referrals, 1 disturbance/fight, 1 DUII, 12 follow up calls, 1 hazard, 1 Hit & Run, 1 juvenile custody dispute, 1 juvenile runaway, 1 motorist assist, 7 noise complaints, 123 premise checks, 10 suspicious circumstances, 3 suspicious persons, 5 suspicious vehicles, 1 suicide attempt, 20 traffic stops, 3 unwanted subjects and 2 welfare checks. In total we handled 234 activities for the month of September, 2021.

PLANNING NEWS - PUBLIC HEARINGS

On Tuesday, November 16, 2021 at 6:30 p.m. the Columbia City Planning Commission will be holding two public hearings through Zoom.

One hearing is for a variance to setback requirements to erect a cover over a koi pond in the R-2 zone at 430 Skookum Court.

The other hearing is for a variance to extend an unpermitted carport in the R-2 zone at 100 K Street.

Interested persons are invited to attend the public hearings and present oral and written testimony regarding the applications. If you would like to comment but cannot participate in either of the hearings, you may submit your comments in writing to City Hall by 4:00 p.m. on the date of the hearings.

OPEN BURNING NOVEMBER 6th – 21st BURN PERMIT REQUIRED

Yard debris may be burned outdoors beginning Saturday, November 6th, and ending Sunday, November 21st. Burning is restricted to <u>yard debris only</u>, and burn barrels are prohibited. Yard debris is lawn clippings, leaves, brush, trimmings/prunings, sawdust and wood scraps. It is **not** dirt/gravel, paper/plastic, metal, rocks/bricks, sod, or food waste.

Burn permits are required prior to burning!



Permits are free and can be obtained at City Hall, any Fire Station within the Columbia River Fire & Rescue District, or on their website: www.CRFR.com. Please remember you will also need to call the "Burn Line" at (503) 397-4800 each day to see if it is a burn day.






DONATIONS WELCOMED! NOMINATIONS NEEDED!

REPORTING CONTRACTORS NOT STATE CERTIFIED

What should I do if I suspect a contractor is not State certified? Document everything you witness. These details will assist the Oregon Building Codes Division in performing any necessary investigations. Remember to include as much detail as possible, such as:

- Photographs of the work performed
- Names of businesses involved
- Names of individuals involved
- Description of vehicles
- Copies of bids
- Invoices, receipts or checks

Who do I contact to report contractors working without appropriate State certifications? BCD and CCB have separate authority over different areas of construction activity and complaint reporting processes. Complaints should be submitted to the appropriate agency based on the violation.

HELP PROTECT WATER QUALITY

Household Hazardous Waste:

- Participate in the Columbia County Transfer Station's Household Hazardous Waste Events for the disposal of chemicals, pesticides, herbicides, fluorescent tubes and light ballasts, solvents, thinners, gasoline, diesel, fuels, cleaners, detergents, propane cylinders, etc.
- Properly dispose of used motor oil, antifreeze, paint, etc., at the Columbia County Transfer Station.
- Substitute less hazardous substances for products you use in your home.

Car Care:

 Check your car regularly for oil and antifreeze leaks, and repair any leaks quickly.

Lawn Care and Landscaping:

- Use environmentally sound products on your lawn, garden and landscaped areas.
- If you must use pesticides and/or fertilizers, apply them minimally and properly.

Pet Waste:

- Promptly pick up pet waste.
- Dispose of pet waste by flushing it or placing it in the garbage.
