Many thanks to our local Walmart staff for being amazing community partners and all those who financially donated to this worthwhile project.


KEEP THOSE SIDEWALKS CLEAR

The hearing is for a variance to lot coverage requirements for new construction in the R-2 zone at 2215 The Strand.



River Awareness. Columbia City offers many opportunities to access the Columbia River. This time of year can be a dangerous time if you do not remain vigilant while on or near the water ways. With higher water levels and stronger water flows it only takes a moment to get into a hazardous situation. Pay close attention to your animals while on the beach. The water is cold and animals that normally swim well can become fatigued rapidly. Logs drifting onto the beach can roll over while being crossed

over or under, causing injuries to people and pets. Make sure to check local tides so you don't access an area that is no longer escapable high at tide. When vou keep safety in mind, this area provides areat

DMV NEWS

Oregon residents with a vehicle registration, permit or driver license expiring between Nov. 1, 2020, and April 30, 2021, have up to three months to renew after the expiration date without being cited by law enforcement for an expired license or tags.

The Oregon Department of Transportation and Oregon law enforcement agencies agreed to the new grace period as DMV catches up with a backlog due to COVID-19 restrictions.

Many services are available online at <u>https://dmv2u.oregon.gov/eServices/_/</u> and more will be added soon. Those currently available include:

- Renew your vehicle registration
- Access your DMV profile
- Schedule an appointment
- Replace a lost, damaged or stolen license or ID card
- Pay a reinstatement fee
- Report your change of address
- Report the sale of your car
- Calculate vehicle fees to mail in title and registration applications

You can also download forms and complete many transactions by mail, including vehicle title transfers. Find detailed instructions at <u>www.OregonDMV.com</u>. DMV is continually improving it's website to help you get what you need.
