PROPOSED FIRE STATION - ON HOLD

Mayor Sue Ziglinski would like to thank everyone who took the time to attended meetings, submitted surveys and signed a petition in regards to the possibility of placing a fire station in Columbia City's Bundy Park. This last meeting was well attended with different people sharing their opinions. A petition opposing the use of Bundy Park for the proposed Fire Station was received and added to the City's research. Thank you to those involved in obtaining signatures and bringing community concerns to the City Council.

At this time, the City has made no commitment to allow the Fire District to place a new fire station in Columbia City. It was decided at this last meeting to put the research of this project on hold.

CITY ADMINISTRATION UPDATES

On July 21st, the City said goodbye to our City Administrator, Michael McGlothlin. He began his career here in 2009 as our Chief of Police and in 2019, he transitioned into the role of City Administrator/City Recorder. A VIEW INTO THE PAST Columbia City during the Depression – from a little girls point of view By Mark Stevens -

In December 1988 Jean LeMont sat down and interviewed Jean Schell (formerly Imogene Bergman), daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Hank Bassine Sr. (9/4/1914-2/28/2005)



A twinkle in her eyes and a big smile across her face came when I asked Jean Schell if she would share her memories of Columbia City.

One of her first responses was the parties and dances that were held at the Community Hall. She explained that entire families

attended. At times the kids lined the benches along the wall, but everyone joined in the fun and dancing. They shared their dinner there at night. She said there used to be some "good" fights there, too - mostly among the young men. She remembered walking paths around the City, and one led to the Community Hall!

She does not remember paved streets, but there was a plank road to the logging camp on the hill. In the summertime, when it was "barefoot weather," she remembers her brothers coming home with some of the worst slivers from that plank road. The road went across where the highway is now and way up the hill; it led to the River where the logs were dumped into the River. She said they had been instructed not to play on that plank road, but they did anyway; it was exciting for them. Looking back, she realizes it was dangerous. She also remembered a lighthouse by the road that went to the River. She said there was an old ex-sea captain who lit the lamp every night.

She recalls playing in the World War I Shipyards, and there was a plank road in that area also. Another favorite play area was an old abandoned school near the Community Hall. There were blackboards left in the building which they especially enjoyed. (This is probably the site of the Academy located at Second and "J" Streets.) She said no doubt Columbia City was a booming area during World War I.

She confirmed reports the Bassines had the first crystal radio in Columbia City, and neighbors congregated at their home to listen to it. She gave credit to Charles Hofer, who she remembers as a genius who lived somewhat in seclusion at the top of the hill, for putting it together and giving it to Hank Bassine Sr., her stepfather. She recalls the neighbors and her family took turns using the ear phones to listen to this "prized" radio at the Bassine home. She said Mr. Hofer had a radio at this time, but he and his wife and son lived so far back in the woods that it probably wasn't considered as living in Columbia City. *To be continued...*

Summer. With summer in full swing the beaches at Pixie Park and Trestle Beach have been busy. Please keep safety in mind when visiting. Make sure you lock your vehicles and don't leave out any items of value in plain view. If you take items to eat or drink onto the beach, please take your garbage out with you. Do not leave left over food as there are many dogs that visit the beach and human food products are not recommended for them. Please

avoid taking glass items onto the beach, broken glass is an extreme hazard to both animals and other people visiting. We hope you have a safe and enjoyable visit to the local beaches.
