On Friday, November 10, 2023 Mayor Susan (Sue) Ziglinski passed away.

She would often say, "Never be boring". . . and she certainly never was!!!! Sue will be remembered as having a "sparkling" personality which was reflected by her color coordinated outfits from head to toe including glittery eye shadow.

Sue and her family moved to Columbia City in 1993. She started as a City Council member and served for four years before becoming Mayor on January 19, 2023. Though she had not been Mayor long, she really got involved with the community and truly enjoyed learning all about her new role.

She was very generous with her time, and besides being Mayor of Columbia City, she was active in many other organizations including the Columbia Pacific Food Bank, Native American Rehabilitation Center, Stumptown Stages and the Oregon Golf Association, just to name a few.

Scott Ziglinski, Sue's son was quoted to say, "She was the person you sought out when the most important thing in the world was to hear something positive."

City Staff, and others, will remember her fun email sign-off: "Never drive faster than your guardian angels can fly."

Family advised that a public memorial service will not be held until sometime in the summer of 2024. When information becomes available it will be posted to the City's website and Facebook page.

VACANT CITY COUNCIL POSITION

On Thursday, November 16, 2023 the City Council of Columbia City unanimously voted City Council member Katrina Claridge to take over as Mayor of

Columbia City until the next general election.

With Katrina taking on the role as Mayor, there is a vacancy on the City Council. If you are interested in serving on the City Council, you must have resided in Columbia City for at least one year immediately before appointment to office and be a qualified elector.

A VIEW INTO THE PAST The Sommarstrom Shipbuilding Company (Part 2)

You may wonder, why did the Sommarstrom's pick Columbia City for a shipyard? It turns out it was due to a local connection. On May 11, 1917 an article was published in the St. Helens Mist that stated that M. F. Sommarstrom had made a visit to the Northwest in search of a suitable shipyard site and that when he passed Columbia City he recognized the potential there. The article also mentions that upon returning to San Francisco that he mentioned to a Mr. Baxter who was a prominent banker that he had found the site he intended to purchase to build the shipyard and Mr. Baxter tells him he is familiar with the site.

Yes, Mr. Baxter was quite familiar with the site. There was much more to this than meets the eye. Mr. Baxter was none other than the husband of the widow of

Senator George Wycliffe McBride who had passed away in 1911 leaving property in Columbia City to his wife Laura. Laura was none-other than the sister-in-law of Lucinda McBride Caples. Lucinda and George McBride's father was Dr. Thomas McBride. Laura had married Maxwell P. Baxter after George McBride died.

The majority of the property that the Sommarstrom's had purchased was owned by Hezekiah Caples. So, Laura was the wife of George McBride who was the brother-n-law of Hezekiah Caples. Hezekiah is the father of my Great Grandfather Hugh



Caples. Hugh married my Great Grandmother Ida LeRoy Armstrong. Hugh and Ida had no children. So Hezekiah is my Great Great Grandfather but not by blood. So quite simply, Laura Baxter was the wife of the brother-in-law of the uncle of the husband of my Great Grandmother. To make matters even more confusing for me is that Hezekiah's wife Minerva Bonser is my cousin which makes my Great Grandfather Hugh Caples also my cousin.

If you can follow all of that, more power to you, as it kind of reminds me of the song "I am my own grandpa".

So it was no coincidence that M. F. Sommarstrom chose Columbia City. It made a good story that as he passed by the city he found it enticing. In reality his good friend had real estate interest here.

So I guess if George McBride had not passed on when he did that there may never have been a shipyard at Columbia City and the future of the South end of the city would have looked quite different. Since the home my folks purchased was built by the Sommarstrom's I may have never been born here and lived here and thence this story would have never been written.

Next we will discuss what changes took place in Columbia City in order to facilitate the construction of eight wooden ships.

COLUMBIA CITY COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (CERT) INFORMATIONAL SURVEY

The Columbia City Mayor and City Council are requesting a public interest survey regarding the formation of a Columbia City Community Emergency Response Team (CERT).

The CERT program educates local and regional volunteers about disaster preparedness for the hazards that may occur where they live. CERT members are trained to save lives and property until professional responders (Police, Fire, and Medical) can arrive. These volunteers are specially trained to

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help others, without putting themselves in harm's way.

The CERT program trains volunteers in basic disaster response skills, such as:

- Fire safety
- · Light search and rescue
- Team organization
- Disaster medical operations
- Disaster Preparedness

The basic CERT program is usually about 28 hours of class, offered on Saturdays and Sundays for about a month. There are additional advanced classes for those who complete basic CERT training and want to learn and do more.

The City Council is looking for 10 to 12 interested community volunteers, no younger than 18 years of age, who can pass a basic background check, and who are interested in helping their local community during local and regional disaster events, i.e. earthquakes, floods, volcanic activities, fires, and medical assistance needs.
