OPEN BURNING PERIOD FOR YARD DEBRIS COMING IN NOVEMBER

Columbia City's burn period is scheduled to begin Saturday, November 4, and end Sunday, November 19.

Burning is restricted to yard debris only (lawn clippings, leaves, brush, trimmings/pruning, sawdust and wood scraps). It is not for dirt/gravel, paper/plastic, metal, rocks/bricks, sod or food waste. Burn barrels are prohibited!

Burn permits are required prior to burning! Permits are free and can be obtained at City Hall, any Fire Station within the Columbia River Fire & Rescue District, or on their website: www.CRFR.com. Please remember you will also need to call the "Burn Line" at (503) 397-4800 each day to see if it is a burn day and follow all regulations outlined on the permit.

A VIEW INTO THE PAST The Sommarstrom Shipbuilding Company (Part 1) By Mark Stevens markstevens@colcomuseum.org

During World War I due to the loss of U.S. ships from German submarine warfare in the Atlantic, the United States Shipping Board (USSB) created the Emergency Fleet Corporation (EFC) to address the need to fill the losses by granting contracts to build steam freighters. Steel was in short supply and the EFC turned to wooden ship building companies to help fulfill their needs.



On May 14, 1917, a month after the United States entered WWI, Hezekiah Caples sold property from the Columbia River up to 4th Street and bounded by L Street to the North all the way to what we know now as Dalton Lake to the South to M. F. (Matts Felix) Sommarstrom. The Sommarstrom family had built ships in Sweden and when the boundaries changed to Finland decided to move to San Francisco to build wooden ships and were looking for a spot to construct a new shipyard in the Northwest to build wooden vessels for the EFC.

The following article appeared in the February 22, 1918 St. Helens Mist.

"The natural advantage of Columbia City for deep water location is most remarkable, and this modest though picturesque and beautiful place on the magnificent Columbia River has at last come into just recognition as a shipbuilding point and as a factor in the world's progress.

The Sommarstrom Shipbuilding Company, of which Major Tilden is president, is here located. It is a most ideal place for a shipyard, being provided with excellent deep water facilities. The river is over a mile wide at this point, giving plenty of room for launching. This shipyard occupies a commanding location, the land being on a gradual slope down to the river, and

roundabout on almost every side are beautiful forests of the noted fir trees for which Oregon is so famous. Looking northward, one stands in awe and admiration, gazing upon the wonderful expanse of water and on the opposite shore viewing Mt. St. Helens and Mt. Hood. At this time of the year these mountains are snow-covered and dazzling in splendor, a most inspiring spectacle. Columbia City, until recently, was a modest country place of scattered homes and one grocery store and post office. Last July, Major Tilden, with others, looked for a location for a new ship-building plant and having discovered the place, behold now the change, almost unbelievable, in so short a time. Three large hotels, over thirty new houses, modern in every detail and two stores have been erected, and a large hall and club house is being built and more residences. When the club house is completed another Red Cross benefit will be given. Thus, in a about six months' time, a new city has sprung into existence like a mushroom in the night, the shipyard alone having one of the best equipment's to be seen on the whole Columbia River. The noise of the building of the ships rings in our ears day and night-a joyous sound Indeed in these times of submarine ravishes."

What a picture to take in, but glad it's quieter today.

One of the instruments sounded as if it was singing. It was a great adventure and she learned so much about their culture.
