# SPRING BURN PERIOD April 16<sup>th</sup> to April 21<sup>st</sup>

The biannual burn period will begin on Saturday, April 6<sup>th</sup>, and end on Sunday, April 21<sup>st</sup>. The burn period is for yard debris only and it must be a burn



day. Burn barrels are prohibited. Burn permits are required prior to burning! Permits may be obtained online at <a href="https://www.crfr.com/burn-information">www.crfr.com/burn-information</a>. Call (503) 397-4800 for burn day information each day before you burn.

#### CHIEF'S CORNER

Nighttime Pedestrians. We have been receiving information that citizens are seeing more people walking around during the night. We appreciate your watchfulness and ask that you

continue to take care of each other and your neighborhoods. If you see someone entering yards or driveways, please call the non-emergency number (503-397-1521) or 911 if you believe they are committing a crime. With the weather improving we will likely see more activity like this during the nighttime hours. We try to take a proactive approach, but your call will ultimately be the key to reducing the nighttime activity.

The Police Department serviced the following calls during February 2024: 1 audible alarm, 5 animal complaints, 5 assist persons, 7 behavior health calls, 2 civil actions, 1 civil enforcement, 2 assist fire, 2 death investigations, 9 follow ups, 2 cold frauds, 1 juvenile problem, 1 juvenile runaway, 1 motorist assist, 1 noise complaint, 1 ordinance violation, 111 premise checks, 2 suspicious persons, 1 suspicious vehicle, 2 suicide threats, 2 non-injury traffic crashes, 2 cold thefts, 4 traffic complaints, 27 traffic stops and 1 welfare check. In all the Police Department serviced 207 activities.

#### **CODE ENFORCEMENT – WEED ABATEMENT**

The weed abatement season is here once again. Please consider this a friendly reminder City ordinances prohibits the uncontrolled growth of weeds, grass and other noxious vegetation.

Starting April 15<sup>th</sup> and ending September 30<sup>th</sup> weeds and grass cannot exceed 10 inches in height. An owner or person in charge of property shall cut down or destroy vegetation **as often as needed to prevent it from becoming unsightly,** from becoming a fire hazard, or, in case of weeds or other noxious vegetation, from maturing or **going to seed.** 

If you hire a business to help keep your property compliant, please be sure they have a current City business license. Also available at City Hall is a list of mowing and yard maintenance companies for anyone interested.



# A VIEW INTO THE PAST An Update on Past Articles

As I continue to research Columbia City history I occasionally run across new information pertaining to past articles I have presented in this forum. Recently I ran across two new items that I thought worthy of sharing.



The first bit of new information pertains to the 1872 Academy that was on Second Street across from City Hall. While I shared a little of what was known about the Academy in the April 2022 newsletter, what I didn't have was a photo to share with you. Last week I ran across an article in the July 7, 1935 Portland Journal that described the removal of the old school. It stated in part "Finis was written this week for an old frame building, formerly owned by Fred Caples of Columbia City, which stood vacant for many years on one of the main streets of that City. The structure was wrecked by Ed Graham and E. E. Cox for lumber to use for farm buildings on the Jim Blaha place near Warren." While the photo in the article isn't of the greatest quality, it gives me hope that maybe a better one will show up in the future.

The second bit of new information involves the McVey House on the Strand (See March 2023 Newsletter).

In this snippet of an aerial photo (on the left) (credit: Von Smith) taken in 1958 you can see what the riverside view of the house appeared like in 1958.



Compare it to the photo on the right (credit: CCMA via Les Watters) taken in roughly 1890 of a building that was just South of the old Hotel (See Sept 2022 Newsletter). You can clearly see that they are the same building. This is further confirmed by the writings of Mary Maclay Whittier (Elijah McVey's niece) who stated that the old hotel was right next to the McVey house.

Looking at a 1998 photo of the house, the entire bottom floor has now been modified. What I find very interesting is that the McVey house originally either had a façade on it or was a flat roof building. I believe it was the latter as the McVey house now has a very shallow slope of a roof on it which was

not typical of an 1870's house which would have had a roof similar to the Caples 1870 house. If you look in last month's newsletter you will also find an uncanny resemblance to Elijah Store McVey's Grocery



which was built between 1890 and 1900. He would probably have patterned his new store after his old store which was now his house.
