

COLUMBIA CITY DOG PARK - RISKS CLOSURE

The City's Dog Park is once again experiencing large volumes of dog poop making grass maintenance difficult.



Prior to mowing the week of July 21st, Public Works outlined 77 piles of poop that had not been picked up! Thankfully those identified piles were picked up by an unknown female park user. Her extra effort is greatly appreciated but it should not fall on just one person or city employees. The park is stocked with bags and garbage cans so that picking up after your dog is easy and convenient.

This park is such a great asset to the City, please do your part and pick up after your dog, also consider picking up other poop you see left behind in the park to help keep the park open.

CHIEFS CORNER

Fire Hazard. The current dry conditions have made

outdoor fires very dangerous. During recent walks on Trestle Beach, I have found several spots where fires have been left with hot embers still burning. If one of these fires were to ignite surrounding vegetation and start a fire, it would



spread very quickly and put many homes and citizens in danger. Whoever leaves a fire like this can be held responsible for criminal and civil penalties, so do not light any fires on the beach this time of year. Also carry out what you bring in. Do not leave used diapers, broken glass, paper wrappers, or other discarded items of trash behind. This could lead to the access points being closed for good.

The Police Department serviced the following calls during June 2025: 7 animal complaints, 4 assist persons, 1 attempt to locate, 2 behavioral health, 1 criminal mischief, 2 domestic disputes, 1 extra patrol, 3 follow ups, 2 harassment/treats, 1 hazard, 1 hit & run non injury, 2 juvenile problems, 2 motorist assists, 1 noise complaint, 3 ordinance violations, 1 overdose, 1 parking complaint, 37 premise checks, 1 lost/found property, 1 prowler, 1 subject stop, 3 suspicious circumstances, 2 suspicious persons, 4 suspicious vehicles, 1 cold theft, 5 traffic complaints, 1 trespass, 21 traffic stops, 1 unwanted person and 3 welfare checks. In all the Police Department serviced 122 activities.


A second grade class photo from 1976-77 was found on Spinnaker Way on July 13, 2025, and turned into City Hall. If you think it's yours please contact us.


A VIEW INTO THE PAST
Remembering Columbia City - A Child's view of prohibition and the Great Depression - Part 6

I remember Mrs. Condon at the store one Halloween had us little kids paint her windows with soap so the big kids wouldn't use wax on them. After Halloween, she got us little kids to help wash the windows. That soap came right off easier than wax, so then she gave us a lot of penny candy.

There was a shingle mill for a while down by what is now Pixie Park. A man and his wife ran it for a while until they ran out of cedar. Then they moved across the river to Kalama. How did we get honey back then? Well, one day a hunter came to see Mr. Morgan and told him where he had seen a bee tree. Mr. Morgan got a couple of his boys, and my dad, and a couple of the Lusk boys. I went along with my dad. We had to hike in about two miles to where we found the tree. It was a big tree, so they had to fall it. When we got it down, Mr. Morgan could go right in, because bees wouldn't sting him. We carried out all that honey and most everyone in town had some honey to put on their biscuits the next day.

Maxmire Logging had a camp up what is now Smith Road. They had a cookhouse and about three bunkhouses, but they ran out of timber and had to shut it down.

We had an airplane crash near the old camp. My family and I were at my cousin's house one Saturday night to play pinochle, and when we got ready to go home we stepped outside and could hear a plane. In those days there were not too many around.



(Don Caples visited the crash site as well and collected a piece of fabric from the plane. The crash occurred on January 8, 1932 and was flying at night using beacons to guide it and apparently miscalculated and crashed into a large fir tree.)

It sounded like this was lost and then we heard a crash. The next morning I got up real early and got my best friend and we went to find the plane. We went up the logging road that went up the hill where the stoplight is now, that comes out on Smith Road. We hiked until we found the wreck. The state police were already there and had taken the pilot and another man out.

About the bridge across the railroad tracks: this was a good place for us kids to have some fun and for the engineer to have his fun also. We would all congregate on the bridge when the train was due.

We could see the train come around the corner, and I swear I could see that old engineer laughing as he came straight at us.

When he got directly under the bridge, he would shoot off steam and blow the whistle. It seemed like



we could hear him chuckle as he went down the track. I know when he came around

that corner and didn't see any kids when we were in school, it was a big disappointment to him.

- Bring product in original container and Secure Your Load -

Please note: Containers used to transport liquids for disposal will not be returned. This streamlines the process and keeps everything running smoothly, minimizing wait times. Thank you for your understanding!

MEDICAL SHARPS must be in sealed, OSHA approved, puncture-proof containers (available at the Transfer Station scale house).

For All OTHER MATERIALS including materials from Very Small Quantity Generators (VSQGs, <220 lbs./mo.) and liquids in containers larger than 5 gallons, call Marc Winkler | ACT Enviro (916.693.4496) at least 2 weeks prior to an event for an appointment.
