OREGON DMV TO INCREASE VEHICLE TITLE **AND REGISTRATION FEES**

As part of House Bill 3991, vehicle title and registration fees will increase starting December 31, 2025. The transportation funding bill, passed on September 29, 2025 by a three-fifth's majority of the Oregon Legislature, will raise revenue to maintain the quality, safety and reliability of Oregon's transportation system.

A VIEW INTO THE PAST Remembering Columbia City

Columbia City's Oldest Home (sort of) Part 2 by Mark Stevens - markstevens@colcomuseum.org

Now to answer the question of what does the old building in St. Helens have to do with Columbia City. Richard Spiro wrote an article for the Columbia City Heritage Committee around 1989 that mentions that a home here was built from the lumber from an old store in St. Helens. Glorene and I scoured the old Sentinel Mist Newspapers until we found the following article:

Sentinel Mist Friday, July, 1941

"Sin-Tainted Boards To Make House For Columbia City Pastor, Wife.

If the boards with which Pastor J. K., Knapp, of the Columbia City Foursquare church is building his new parsonage, (if the walls) could talk they could tell some tall tales. And some of these tales, be it here remarked, might be entirely out of keeping with the lumber's respectable job as an important part in the parsonage of a minister.

For the lumber with which this house is being constructed"... "has run the gamut of occupations -- pool hall, movie palace and store being among the more prominent."

"Pastor Knapp decided he wanted a new parsonage. (the) Result was that the mill owners gave the parson the go ahead on his offer to wreck the building and he is now in the midst of the job. Despite the fact that the lumber is laden with history and mildly tainted with sin, Rev. Mr. Knapp is of the opinion that he'll have an A No. 1 parsonage when he gets through. Boards from the old structure are nearly as sound as the day they were put in and some of the ancient square iron nails with which the building was put together may be of use in the five room house now being constructed.

During its prime as a flicker palace and pool hall the

old building did its part in promoting a good many of the boys along what some folks are pleased to call the primrose path. It seems only fitting and proper, therefore, that it should spend its sunset years keeping the Oregon rain off a minister and his wife. In a way, Pastor and Mrs. Knapp will probably be a good influence on the hard-bitten lumber which will make up their new parsonage."



Richard Spiro made some references to where the parsonage was located and after viewing early aerials, I found what I thought was the home. I subsequently contacted Dianne, the current owner, and she graciously allowed us to inspect the building. Upon viewing the crawl space, attic, and some interior openings in walls, and finding very old lumber, there is no doubt that we had located the building in question.

I would even say that the current home even resembles the old building in many ways.

So there you have it. Columbia City, in some manner, has one of the oldest buildings in the county.
